Keynote Speakers



Christine A. Tanner, RN, PhD, FAAN

Yeomans-Spaulding Distinguished Professor, OHSU SN, USA Editor in Chief, Journal of Nursing Education

Dr. Tanner's research focuses on development of expertise in clinical judgment and the impact of different education models on the development of skill in clinical judgment. For the last decade, she has been involved in creating educational solutions to the nursing shortage, including ways to increase enrollment and prepare a new kind of nurse in the context of rapid changes in the nursing practice environment and rapidly evolving health care needs. She currently involved in the development of a new clinical education model that is better suited to the development of the "new" nurse.

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Mi Ja Kim, RN, PhD, FAAN

Professor and Dean Emerita

Executive Director, Global Health Leadership Office

Director, Academy of International Leadership Development, UIC, USA

Dr. Kim's research interests include evaluation of the quality of nursing doctoral education in 7 countries: Australia, Japan, Korea, South Africa, Thailand, UK, and USA. Dr. Kim served as a member of the Study Section and the National Advisory Council, NINR, NIH; and international advisor of the Research Assessment Exercise of the Higher Education Funding Council of the UK. She currently is the Treasurer/Board of Trustees of the Commission on Graduates of Foreign Nursing Schools; Editorial Board of Journal of Advanced Nursing; and Chair of the Board of Directors of the Global Korean Nursing Foundation in the United States and South Korea.

Plenary Speakers



Carroll Iwasiw, RN, BN, MScN, EdD

Professor & Former Director of the Arthur Labatt Family School of Nursing University of Western Ontario, Canada

Dr. Iwasiw has chaired the Ontario Council of University Nursing programs and the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing Accreditation Bureau. She was named a World Expert on Nursing Education by the World Health Organization. Dr. Iwasiw led the development of a nursing management curriculum in Russia and the creation of Rwanda's only baccalaureate nursing program. As well, she co-founded and continues as an editor of The International Journal of Nursing Education Scholarship.



Frances Kam Yuet Wong, RN, PhD

Professor, School of Nursing, Hong Kong Polytechnic University, Hong Kong

Dr. Wong's research work and publications are in the areas of advanced nursing practice, transitional care and nursing education. She has published over 90 papers and chapters in internationally refereed journals and reviewed books. She is now the Honorary Nurse Consultant at the Hospital Authority, Hong Kong, the External Secretary of the preparatory group for the Hong Kong Academy of Nursing, the advisor of the Higher Education Curriculum Design Committee, China and an elected member of the Core Steering Group of the Advanced Nursing Practice Network, International Council for Nurses.



Margaret McMillan, RN, PhD, OAM

Professor of Nursing (Conjoint)
Faculty of Health, University of Newcastle, Australia

Dr. McMillan's research over two decades has focused on practice and education issues and practice redesign. Her primary research foci included an elaboration of the Boundaries for Safe and Therapeutic Practice, competency standards and consumer needs and responses to care. Her translational research has led to significant policy and practice change in nursing care in Australia and internationally through involvement in projects in South Korea, Thailand, India, South Africa, Indonesia and The Maldives.
